### \$10,000 Gift To Surry Medical Ministries

In December 2023, a gift was presented to Surry Medical Ministries to help them expand their services for children.

Since 1993, this ministry has worked with Surry County citizens in need to provide a better quality of life by ensuring families have access to the comprehensive healthcare services everyone deserves – regardless of one's ability to pay.

The Rye Foundation gift allowed up to 200 children to receive care they may otherwise not have had access to, as well as allowed for the purchase of Bibles in both English and Spanish.

### All-State Youth Choir Update

Due in part to a Rye Foundation Donation, The 2024 All-State Youth Choir of North Carolina toured this past summer in the eastern half of the state during the week of July 14th. Under the dynamic leadership of Dr. Aaron Rice, these talented students pulled off an amazing feat—preparing breathtaking music in just three days! They shared their gift in both ministry and concert, making a lasting impact everywhere they went.

Their performances included historic churches, a children's home, and a senior living center, and the choir's performances uplifted hearts and built connections that will be remembered for years to come. #### Baptist Association Awarded \$25,000

The New South River Baptist Association was named the recipient of this year's Bryan Award by the Rye Foundation. The recognition included a \$25,000 grant, which the Association is utilizing to expand its ministries to children in military families.

The Bryan Award honors the "life and legacy" of Ray Bryan, a Goldsboro businessman and philanthropist who died in 2016 at the age of 84.

He believed that God has a plan for every child, and that every boy and girl needed

positive role models in the home and in the community.
